Having mildew is a violation



that can be unpleasant to fix

Homeowners in Heather Lakes with "Mildew Violations" have received letters from Bob Moyer of Vanguard Property Management. The letter informs people that they have excessive mildew on their roofs in violation of community codes (see photo above).

The letter goes on to say that neighbors consider the mildew unsightly, it may degrade the roof and it may cause heat retention that will add to air conditioning bills.

The letter from Vanguard notes that a roof cleaning company has agreed to clean the roofs for a special \$25 cost. The cleaning is done with high pressure water. People who have had the cleaning done complain that the cure may be worse than the disease,

Homeowners contemplating having their roofs cleaned by high pressure water may need to check if the procedure will damage their shingles. In the past, it seems that high pressure water has blown the tiny rocks off the shingles. Residents have been told by shingle manufacturers that this may reduce the life of the shingles by as much as five years and violate the roof warranty.

Alternate mildew cleaning procedures include applications of common household bleach diluted in water (about 1:20) that can be done with low pressure systems. Homeowners may be able to use garden hose attachments to spray the solution themselves. However, check first. Putting straight bleach on the roof could damage it. And cover any plants that may get solution on them.

There may be a metal strip that could be put on the crest of the roof to prevent mildew, too. If you look at a roof with mildew on it you probably notice that there is no mildew just below the metal pipes and flues sticking up. At press time we could not find a metal strip procedure, but we will keep looking and get back to you.

The important thing is, check with your roofer or shingle manufacturer about damage and warranties before having any procedure done to your roof.



By using simple math, you can determine your investment return

Everybody knows that the greater the rate of return, or an investment, the greater the growth of the investment. But; do you know how much difference even a small rate increase can make? And an even more important question would be: "Do you know how to measure and/or calculate your return?"

Let's look at the first issue which is best illustrated by applying "The Rule of 72." Essentially, this mathematical principle which states that a sum will double in a certain number of years which is determined by dividing the number 72 by the net (after-tax) yield. Thus, your investment will double every 12 years with a net yield of 6%; every 9 years at 8%; every 7.2 years at 10%; and every 6 years at a net yield of 12%. This "difference" becomes much more meaningful when we apply this principle to an actual scenario. So, let's look at a \$10,000 investment and compare the growth over a period of years at different rates of return:

The implications should be quite obvious to those of you who are trying to save for -or make it through -- retirement! You can not afford to accept 6% (net) if you can get 9%

How do you measure your actual yield? If your investment is in a currently-taxable fixed account (an investment not subject to market risk), you can often determine your net yield by multiplying the reported yield by the difference between your marginal tax bracket and 100%. For example, a CD pays you a gross interest rate of 8.5%. Your marginal tax bracket (which can be determined by looking at "schedules X or Z" of the tax "Forms and Instructions" sent to you annually by the IRS), is 28%. 100% minus 28% = 72%. Thus your net return is 6.12% (8.5% x .72).

For other investments, calculating you net yield may be more difficult. Many of us own mutual funds that we purchased based on a reported "average rate of return." This can be very deceptive as "average" really means nothing. It is the effective annual yield on which we must focus. A "20% average annual return" over 10 years can actually result in an effective annualized yield of less than 5%!

Today's interest sensitive life insurance products can also be deceiving. Your annual statement reports a 9% crediting rate; but, the interest was credited only on a part of your contribution. Depending on how you are funding the life policy, the same contract could produce an effective yield ranging from 0% to 8.5% (over a period of time). Sometimes the only way to accurately measure the true rate of return is with a computer and a spreadsheet program.

Don't wait until you retire to find out you could have done better! And, if you're already retired, don't pass up the opportunity to enjoy a more comfortable retirement -- and leave more for your heirs -- thru proper PLANNING!

Your green thumb and general rose care

Diseases: The greatest enemy of the rose is the disease blackspot, which causes black spots on the leaves, yellowing and then dropping of the leaves. There are scores of rose dusts and chemicals on the market such as Captan Funginex etcetera. Most of the special sprays will control blackspot, mildew and insects. Read all label instructions before applying. For the control of Aphids use Ivory liquid dishsoap, four tablespoons to one gallon of water, spray the bush thoroughly, preferably early in the day. Repeat again in three days. Pick off yellow leaves and discard into trash-not around bush.

Watering: Use a soaker hose or apply water to the base of bush. Prevent leaves from getting wet as this will promote black spot or if sprinklers are used, allow enough time for foliage to thoroughly dry before sundown. Remember roses need good drainage and do best in full sun.

Pruning: There are no set rules on a set height to prune roses. You may cut a bush two feet high down to 15 inches, but do not cut one four feet high down that low. One rule to observe: Do not take off more than a quarter of the total height of the bush. Dead limbs can be cut anytime however.



The best time to prune is when there is an apparent dormant time or the weather has cooled off. Canes that arise from the base of plants form the framework of the rose bush. Laterals are the branching stems from the canes. Prune all laterals that are weak or spindly, especially those growing towards the center. After a rose has grown a second season and the canes are crowded, remove some of the older canes at the base. Then cut back the remaining healthy canes. Cut faded blooms back to a five leaflet leaf. Discard spent blooms into trash.

Fertilization: Roses are heavy eaters, especially when in full bloom. Use a well balanced granular rose fertilizer with minor elements every four to six weeks and foliar feed with a water soluble rose fertilizer in between times.

Florida is not the easiest state to have perfect rose bushes without blackspot, mildew or insects. Unless you want to exhibit your roses, be happy with the blooms they produce and learn to have a tolerance for fungus. Otherwise you will drive yourself crazy trying to grow a perfect rose bush!

Mortgages, dependents, and rental property

A recent taxpayer victory in the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals has now broadly defined deductibility of points when re-financing home mortgages. The Appeals Court has more loosely defined acquisition debt and a large number of these loans may be deducted in full. Even when occurring several "years" after acquisition date.

Also, recount the number of heads in your household, according to the IRS code, a dependent need not be a relative to qualify for the dependency exemption. Many taxpayers miss out on legitimate dependent exemption deductions. There are three factors determining dependency status. If they meet the support test, principal residence test and the maximum income test they may be deductible.

Sometimes a conflict arises when rental property is used by a close relative. The owner taxpayer wants to rightfully deduct the losses allowed on the rental property and at the same time wants to help their children by renting the apartment at a substantially low amount. The IRS does not allow loss deductions on a close relative unless the rental fee is at fair market rental value. You must charge the same fee to your children that would ordinarily be charged to unrelated tenants. You could assist your children financially in other matters but substantiate the fair market rental rate.

26.2 mile marathon presents an interesting challenge

Early Sunday morning on December 9, the streets of Brandon will be filled with running enthusiasts, as the Tampa Bay Marathon returns to Brandon and becomes the 1990 Brandon Marathon. The greater Brandon Chamber of Commerce and the Brandon Running Association are the organizers of the event.

The course will begin at Brandon Centre South, weave through Lumsden, Kings, Oakfield, and Providence roads before entering the Crosstown at the Falkenburg entrance. 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
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
