

STREET LIGHTING WOES FOR HOOKER-BARNES by Ron Thompson

Residents of the Hooker-Barnes area me recently to discuss the establishment of a "Street Lighting District" for their area. The initial meeting on September 10 was called by a representative of Hooker-Barnes Homes to inform the homeowners that they would have to petition Hillsborough County before streetlights could be installed. It seems Hooker-Barnes had not followed the lead of other builders in the Bloomingdale area by initiating the necessary paperwork with the County to have the lighting installed. A meeting was also held the following week to discuss the petition, since the builder could not provide complete information at the initial meeting.

Residents of Bloomingdale should note the guidelines for establishing a Street Lighting District, require that a signer of the petition be on the active voter registration file within the proposed district. This restriction is especially distasteful to our neighbors in the military service, and others who have chosen not to move their voter registration to this area.

Because the builder waited until this late date to inform the homeowners of their plight, streetlights may not be seen in the Hooker-Barnes area for 2-3 years. The petition may not be placed on this year's schedule for public hearing in December.

Also on the agenda will be the presentation of those individuals who have been nominated for the Board of Directors of the BHA. Open floor nominations of interested individuals will also be entertained. Elections for the new Board takes place at the November 19 meeting.

Those of you who wish to pay your yearly dues will be able to do so before and after the meeting. Dues this year are \$5 which will carry your membership through 11-1-86.

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OBESITY IN PETS by Dr. Margaret Wissman

An obese animal is one that carries too much body fat. If you cannot easily feel your pet's ribs, it is probably overweight.

The primary cause of obesity is overfeeding of an inactive animal. In rare cases, it may be related to a hormonal imbalance.

Obesity is harmful to your pet. It forces the heart to work harder to pump blood through the miles of extra capillaries that run through the excess fatty tissue.

To loose weight, an animal must burn more calories than it takes in. A veterinarian should be consulted before a weight-loss program is begun. Exercise should be increased very gradually. Walking is an excellent form of exercise.

Often an animal is so inactive that it expends very few calories each day. An animal that gained a lot of weight in the past can maintain an obese state by eating little and moving very little.

As pets age, their metabolism slows down and they require fewer calories than they used to need.

An obese pet can have a shortened expectancy. Changing your pet's poor eating habits is the best thing you can do for its health. Your pet does not want a treat as much as it wants what the treat signifies -attention from you. Plenty of verbal physical affection will reassure your pet that is is loved.



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
STD UPDATE by Glenda Hewitt

During the last week of September, Susan DeLuca and I met with Susan Meitz of Criterion Corporation regarding the Special Taxing District (STD) issue and the Bloomingdale Master Community Association (MHA). From these meetings and talks came about the following information:

- 1. We now have an exact map delineating the areas to be included in the MHA and those areas that Criterion would like to annex into the MHA. This may will be available at the October 15 BHA meeting.
- 2. Criterion has changed their position as of 9/27/85 to saying that the residents on the Board of Trustees for the MHA shall number five and there will be no paid Criterion employees, not any outside individuals either, on this Board. Previously the MHA papers stated that Criterion would occupy three seats and the residents two.
- 3. The Criterion and NIPIC corporations are fully behind the efforts of the residents of Bloomingdale in seeking a STD to maintain 3loomingdale.
- 4. Susan Meitz gave us a detailed budget for the coming year of what Criterion would plan to spend for maintenance and repairs. She also gave us promise of assistance where she is able.
- 5. Jeff West, an Ohio licensed attorney and resident of East, will assist Richard Wheeler who is an attorney based in Brandon to draw up the necessary legal documents for our STD. Mr. Wheeler has agreed to totally volunteer his time and services to our STD cause. You will be seeing more about him in our <u>Gazette</u> in November.
- 6. Criterion has agreed to hold off on the implementation of the MHA for one month to see how we are doing with the STD.
- 7. Susan Meitz, Executive Vice President of Criterion, has agreed to speak at the meeting on October 15 of the BHA.

- 8. Two committees have been established and have held their first meetings: The STD Committee and the Budget Committee.
- 9. The STD Committee, an enthusiastic group of 15 individuals, met on October 3 and came up with the following items:
 - A. Fund Raising in the form of STD Sunday. (See Page 1 of this Gazette.)
 - B. Jeff West as attorney liaison.
 - C. Reviewing of Richard Wheeler, attorney, to represent Bloomingdale.
 - D. Division of work by sections as set up by Helena Cornette for fund raising & petition signing.
 - E. Pursuance of donations from the local builders by Ron Thompson.
- 10. The Budget Committee met on October 8, after the publication of this paper. Their report will be made at the 10/15 meeting.

MOBILE WATCH MONTHLY RECAP by Dave Cvetan

Rather than bombard you with the same old plea, "We need volunteers—we need money," I'm going to share Watch Log information with you each month. The monthly recap will keep you abreast of happenings in our community and, hopefully, spur your interest in the Mobile Watch. Keep in mind that one of our primary roles is to deter crime by being visible to the would—be offender, so in a sense, "No news is good news."

Before providing this month's recap, it's important that you know where I get the information. Briefly, Mobile Watch Base Station operators maintain a watch log during each shift. All observations, incidents, and actions taken by the mobile unit or base station operator are recorded. This record of events (Watch Log) is filed in a binder and rotated to the next base station for ready reference. Occasionally, information is provided to the Sheriff's Department, at their request, to assist them with an investigation (i.e. list of license plate numbers recorded on the evening of a robbery).

The following is a summary of recorded events for the past month (naturally, names/numbers are not included to protect the privace of community residents):

- -- Cars parked in a suspicious manner. Plate number recorded. (5 reports)
- --Garage doors left open after resident had apparently gone to sleep. (3 reports)
 Resident was notified on each occasion.
- --Intentional damage to parked cars. (3 incidents)
- --Request for assistance by a resident. (4 reports)
- --Sheriff's Department called. (5 instances)
 Results of investigation inconclusive.

As a reminder, please close your garage door when retiring for the evening. Open garage doors are an invitation for a burglar to relieve you of valued possessions.

I would like to publicly thank the <u>Bloomingdale Gazette</u> family for donating this space to the Mobile Watch. Their total commitment to the concerns of our community benefit us all!

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SHOPPING CENTER DELAY

As we promised, here is an update on the opping center story.

This paper contacted Mr. Fred J. Hohnadel of Community Shopping Centers, Inc. in Maitland, Florida. He said there has been some delay due to government red tape and the amount of agencies he has had to go through to be able to get the center underway. He stated that the plans are into the Building Department for review. Currently the estimated time to begin construction is about 45 days. We are right now seeing some site work as they have begun to clear out the area. Once construction begins, completion time will be eight months.

Besides Eckerds, Publix, Wal-Mart, Beall's, and McDonalds there will also be a Home Federal Savings and Loan Association next to the TECO substation. Crowder Hardware, a large, old-fashioned hardware store has leased an area of 9,000-10,000 sq. ft. about the size of Eckerd's.

On the other side of the center there are two large parcels of land. One is in negotiations with a very large Tampa-based full-service bank and the other is being looked into for the possibility of becoming an ergency clinic.






MOTHERS VALUED AT A QUARTER-MILLION DOLLARS EACH!

Editor's Note: There is a leash law in this county that is enforceable through the County Dog Control. Their phone number is 272-6620. Dogs not wearing tags or running at large are impounded and held for a minimum of five days or until called for by their owners.

IT'S THE LAW

In accordance with Hillsborough County Ordinance 76-7 (Animal Control Ordinance.)

- All dogs over the age of four (4) months must be vaccinated against Rabies by a Licensed Veterinarian.
- All dogs are required to wear a tag so that it is visible at all times.
- All dogs must be confined to the owner's property or restrained by a leash when in public areas.
- The keeping of vicious or nuisance animals is prohibited.

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PROPOSED PROPERTY TAXES FOR HILLSBOROUGH COUNTY by Sherry A. Hardin

A few weeks ago you probably received a notice of proposed property taxes. You may have wondered how this system works.

Your property is appraised by the County Property Appraiser as of January 1. A tax rate expressed in mills, or 1/10 of a cent, is then applied to the just value of your property as assessed. The tax rate is determined by each taxing unit (city, county, school board) establishing a budget. These budgets are approved in public hearings during the month of September. The final budget meeting was held October 1 at the main court house. This public hearing finalized your tax bill.

Your property taxes are payable between November 1 and April 1. Many of you make the payments in your monthly house payment so there is no need to worry about coming up with an additional amount. For the rest of you, it is the time to consider in your budget a large outlay prior to April 1.
