

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breeze infused with the pungent scents of garlic, cilantro, jasmine, curry and lemon grass. Thailand, an exotic yet faraway locale might spring to mind. Most of us can't afford the trip, but Bloomingdale residents can enjoy the next best thing with a visit to Simply Thai, Bloomingdale's only Thai restaurant, and winner of the Tampa Tribune's 2008 Best of Brandon Readers Poll competition for Asian Cuisine.

Opened in 1998 in its current Bloomingdale Shopping Center location, Simply Thai is truly a family-run business, co-owned by husband and wife team Brian Smith and June Rogers, as well as June's parents, Curtis and Puntip Rogers. Although a family affair, June will admit that owning a

Thai restaurant was primarily her lifelong dream.

June came to the United States with her Thai family and her second father, Curtis, in 1974. Settling in the Brandon area, she attended East Bay High School and then the University of South Florida where she earned a degree in Business Marketing. With her dream restaurant always in her mind, June took to the skies as a flight attendant traveling the world in search of what makes the best Thai restaurant.

With her research complete, the dream became a reality with the opening of Simply Thai.

"I wanted an authentic Thai food-only restaurant, which is why we named our restaurant Simply Thai," June explained, "Everything we serve is home-

made and all traditional Bangkok cuisine."

Describing Thai food, she said, "Thai food is a special niche which uses unique flavors, and

touches all palates; sweet, bitter, salty, sour and hot." But she stressed. Thai food

does not have to be hot, as many people seem to believe. "Thai peppers are the second hottest peppers in the world, but we always ask customers how they want their dish," June said.




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BHA-sponsored Community Clean-up Day Is Oct. 11

In just one week, Bloomingdale residents can unload some of their unwanted garbage at the Bloomingdale Homeowners Association Community Cleanup Day. Here's what you need to know and do to make this event a success.

Cleanup Day is Saturday, Oct. 11 from 9 a.m to 1 p.m. The collection site is on Natures Way at the Hillsborough County Parks maintenance facility just west of Alafia Elementary School.

For a stress-free visit, follow these guidelines:

Arrive early. This popular "first-come, first served" event will close when the six dumpsters are full, or at 1 p.m., whichever comes first. Organizers report past cleanup days have averaged 180 cubic yards of collected debris.

· Provide proof of residency. Although open to all Bloomingdale residents; you must provide a tax bill or utility bill with your name and address for residency verification.

· Limit your drop-offs to two car loads, or one for SUV's, and pick-up trucks.

· Bring appliances, mattresses, used computer

components (printers, faxes, monitors, etc.), water heaters, televisions, steel and other metals, furniture. and non-commercial construction debris.

Sounds pretty simple and straightforward, right? There are some restrictions, however, and residents will be turned away from site access if arriving with any of the following:

• Trailers over one-axle.

· Commercial business waste or trash.

· Regular curbside yard waste or regular household trash.

· Hazardous materials, including paint, batteries, propane tanks, household chemicals and waste from commercial activities.

Again, volunteers are always needed. Volunteer duties include helping with traffic flow and unloading vehicles if needed.

If you want to help with the cleanup day event, call the BHA Community Office at (813) 681-2051 or email inbloomingdalenews@tampabay.rr.com. Include your name, a phone number, and available hours. High school students and Scouts will earn community service hour credits.

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Getting Her Message Out, One Pageant At A Time

Her smile is born of selfconfidence and satisfaction in a job well-done, but it's the smiles she brings to others' faces that are even more important to Bloomingdale resident Katie Greene. In April 2008, 17-yearold Greene was crowned Miss North Central Florida Teen USA 2009.

According to Greene, "The pageant has opened so many doors to so many things," the most satisfying to her being visiting kids in surrounding hospitals.

During those visits, Greene spends time with the children allowing the girls to try on her crown and sash, letting them, in her words, "be queen for a day."

"Seeing the girls' faces when they look up to you, knowing you've helped them to have a better day and just making them smile – that's my favorite part," said Greene, who admits, "I feel bad when I leave because I feel like I get more out of it than they do."

That passion for giving drives Greene in every area of her life. A Durant High School senior, Greene maintains a 4.92 GPA while participating in Leo Club - a high school based version of the Lions Club dedicated to life-long community service, as well as the Best Buddies club - a friendship building program for people with intellectual disabilities; Junior Civitan - a club emphasizing helping people with developmental disabilities; National Honor Society, Student Government Executive Council and Student Advisory Committee. If that's not enough, she also holds two part time jobs, one at The Athletic Club in Brandon

and the other babysitting a set of

triplets three nights a week.

When asked how she manages to juggle everything on her plate, Greene is quick to give credit to her family support system. Dad Jack is a teacher and assistant wrestling coach at Durant and her mother, Terry, is what Greene likes to call her "Momager."

"I call her that because to do all this you have to be very, very, very organized and she helps me so much by keeping me on track with everything I have to do," said Greene.

And to compete in a pageant the caliber of Miss Florida Teen USA takes extensive work and preparation on her behalf. To get into top shape, Greene hits the gym every day. She also travels to Gainesville to work with her director, Chelsee Atkins, a Miss Florida USA alumnus. Greene also works with a local director to hone her interviewing skills. But her favorite part of preparation is shopping for the perfect gown.

"My gown was designed by the owners of Regalia in Orlando and custom made by Sherry Hill," she said.

Greene also had a swimsuit and interview suit designed especially for her. Walking and standing properly are another part of the training, but Greene emphasizes that physical appearance isn't all that matters in pageant competition and that the benefits from such preparation extend far beyond the pageant itself. The poise, self-awareness and interviewing techniques, "are skills that I will use for the rest of my life."

Aware of the common stereotypes of pageant participants, Greene dispels the myth that they are catty, pampered or that

appearance is of the utmost. Her experience has been that contestants get along, laughing and having fun together, do their own hair and makeup, and help each other out if need be.

"All the girls that compete are extraordinary. Most of them have high GPA's, are student government leaders and most have already earned scholarships," said



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Dinner @ 6 6 ingredients, 6 servings or 6 hours in the crock pot

These recipes will help your family have dinner @ 6!

Gone are the days when mom, dad, junior and sissy sat down in a Normal Rockwell setting and dined in harmony on a three-course, well-rounded meal (including Jell-O mold), every night. If we're really honest, those meals are few and far between due to the hectic pace of life in the 21st century. If you have the Norman Rockwell-esque meal 7 nights a week - call me! I need to know your secret. If you don't, read on. It's a rare weeknight in my family when we're all in the same place at 6 p.m. Between after-school activities, sports and jobs in separate counties - the term "witching hour" hardly describes my pre-dinner predica-

ment. So, I've set out to solve the problem, and this column is definitely a by-product of my search for a solution. I've heard it over and over, "Those who fail to plan, plan to fail." I don't know who said it, but I've heard it.

So, here's a plan. Literally. "Dinner @ 6" is a place you can find recipes, time-saving ideas and all-around help in meeting your goal of providing dinner for your family that doesn't come in a box or a sack, no matter what your day has been like. The recipes I provide will either have 6 ingredients or less, serve 6, can be ready by 6 after a long day at work, or can be made in the slow-cooker in 6 hours. But wait, there's more! There isn't room

enough here to meet all the needs and decipher all the dilemmas, so I've set up a blog – "Dinner @ 6" – which can be found at www. dinnerat6-lesliewhite.blogspot. com . That's where all the extras and meal planning help will be. I invite you to come by, take a look around, try the extra recipes as well as share your own successes, recipes, comments and

questions. Now, let's get to it. The first recipe is one of my mama's, who somehow managed to work full time and still have a great dinner on the table every night. Her key to success was planning, planning, planning. And, to this day, she still keeps these ingredients on hand for a fast dinner fix. Mama's Enchiladas 1 (12.5 oz.) can breast of chicken 1 small onion 1 tablespoon butter 1 (10 oz.) can enchilada sauce Shredded cheddar or Monterey Jack cheese Flour tortillas



)

Dice onion and sauté in butter over medium heat in frying pan. While onion is sautéing, drain can of chicken of all juices and separate the chunks in the can with a fork. Once onion is tender, add chicken and enchilada sauce, stirring to combine. Let this simmer over medium-low heat while you warm up the flour tortillas and grate cheese to top. You can also top with salsa and sour cream.

"This pageant experience has truly been about Katie's passion and commitment to herself and others," said her mother, Terry. What Katie will take away from this experience will carry with her for many, many years to come. As she prepares to graduate high school and enter college, her dad and I couldn't be more proud of the person she's become."

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

Rapping Author Visits Cimino

"A" is for author and "M" is for Michael Shoulders, the award-winning children's author who recently visited Cimino Elementary School.

Shoulders shared his love of reading and some tips for writing with each grade level, giving them an animated speech and a vivid slide-show showing how his books are conceptualized and then illustrated. The author is best known for his alphabet and counting books set in various states around the South.

Shoulders hails from Clarksville, Tennessee, where he spent 25 years in the school system as both an educator and administrator.

"Reading and writing are vital to students' success, both in school and in life," he said.

He emphasizes reading in his travels around the U.S. visiting schools.

"Families who communicate about school, and families who read together, produce more successful students," said Shoulders. His story "Say Daddy," illus-

trates the role reading played in his own life and the life of his children. For this author, reading books as well as writing them, is a family affair. Shoulders and his wife, Debbie, have co-authored

"D is for Drum: A Native American Alphabet," which Learning Magazine recently named the Teacher's Choice Award winner for 2008.

The Shoulders' have three children, each of which have appeared in illustrations in his work. His middle child, Ryan, also has appeared on Season 7 of Survivor.

Reading and writing have played a major role in all of their lives, according to Shoulders. But reading isn't the only thing the author focuses on in his interactive presentations. He believes writing is just as important and gave the students a visual example of the publishing process, having various students pose as "rough draft" and subsequent "rewrites" along with an editor and a publisher. The students learned about his personal experience of submitting work only to have it rejected numerous times, until finally an editor suggested some changes and bought his first book, "V is for Volunteer: A Tennessee Alphabet Book," in 2001. Though the process can be long, and at times, discouraging, Shoulders encouraged the students to never give up.

Cimino Elementary media specialist Nancy Waters con-

tacted Shoulders to visit Cimino after a group of teachers attended a literacy conference at which Shoulders was a featured speaker.

"The teachers went crazy over him and said I just had to get him to come to our school," said Waters.

The students had the same reaction to Shoulders, who tailored each presentation to the age level he was speaking to. At the end of his segment on writing, Shoulders suddenly morphed into rapper "63 Cent," named so because in his words, "Tm bigger than 50 Cent."

Donning some bling and a headband, Shoulders wowed the Cimino student body with his hip-hop abilities as he rapped to his "V is for Volunteer: A Tennessee Alphabet Book."

Cimino was Shoulders' last stop on a three-day visit to several Hillsborough County schools. At each school, he spent a portion of his time signing books for each student who purchased one. On the way out the door, first and second graders high-fived him and more than one told him, "You're cool!" "So is reading," he answered one student. Not able to make a Friday night? You can find the Coppis and the club at Sonics on Hwy.




60 on Wednesday nights. Tuesday evenings, they head over to the Sonics in Plant City on Hwy. 39.

RAD is not a martial arts course.

C.P.E.A. educates and trains children in groups aging from 5 to 7 and 8 to 12. Bill noted that, "The techniques and skills learned through RAD can be life saving. Being able to escape from an attacker can make the difference in being a survivor and being missing or dead. There are those who would harm our children and our children need to know to defend themselves."

Updates From State Representative Rich Glorioso


