"Right after college, I taught physical education in middle and high school for six years over in Pinellas County," she said. "During that time, I also served as an athletic trainer and aided in the creation of a curriculum for the Care and Prevention of Athletic Injuries class offered in the high schools."
Kasper is currently working on her master's in physical education.

Part of my job is actually educating my athletes on their injuries and how to take care of themselves," explained Kasper. "The position I hold at USF is considered staff
allows for an ATC to work in a high school setting full time, meaning we cover all practices, home games and football away games. We are present on campus daily and over the summer for any type of organized practice."

Not only is she an ATC, but Kasper continued her education to include licensed massage therapy.
"I have found it to really implement my practices," she said.

Injuries are of the utmost concern to athletes, coaches and parents.
"We have seen competition grow more intense with time and our athletes definitely feel that pressure," said Kasper.

One issue Kasper and coaches face is getting their athletes to communicate about their injuries. Many are apprehensive and fear speaking up because it could cost them practice or playing time.
"What they may fail to realize is that they risk
making the injury much without notifying us,"

Kasper. said. "This put ${ }^{\text {T }}$ them in a situation where little can be done to help them and the end result may be costly to their health as well as their season."
The ultimate goal is for good communication to be established so that athletes get the treatment and training they need and a plan is created and put in to place that will allow them to return to full play safely. One of the most common injuries Kasper sees is preventable, she says.
"In each athletic season, heat illness rears its ugly head repeatedly, even in our winter and spring sports," she said. "Educating our athletes on how ts prepare their bodies for the daily rigors of sports is crucial."

She stresses that it must be a team effort between coaches, parents and trainers like her. Athletes need to be taught about rehydration and proper diet, and even when to eat, all of which greatly reduce the risk of a sports injury.
"Currently in football, we perform weigh ins before and after practice to get our athletes to see the physical proof that they lose weight due to exertion and water loss. It allows me to monitor their progress and red flag individuals if they become at risk," Kasper said.

And risk is a word that comes to the mind of many parents concerned about the prevalence of swine flu and MRSA. Kasper addresses both of those issues in an infory mative brochure she provides to families of each and every athlete enrolled in a sport at Bloomingdale. She encourages parents to be proactive anc know the facts and feels that "education is the best weapon against these conditions."

## Southwest Crock-Pot Chicken <br> 6 boneless, skinless chicken breasts, frozen

1 can black beans, undrained
1 can kernel corn, undrained
$11 / 2$ cup salsa
Salt and pepper
Put frozen, yes frozen, chicken breasts in bottom of crock pot. Salt and pepper them. Pour can of beans, corn and salsa over chicken. Set crock pot on low and cook eight hours. During the last 30 minutes, you can put an 8-ounce block of cream cheese on top and let it soften. Serve over rice and top with cheddar cheese, sour cream and more salsa, if preferred. If you need a faster cooking time, I recommend thawing the chicken breasts and cooking on low for four to five hours, depending on thickness of breasts.
If your crock pot can hold it, add a few extra breasts and add another can of beans, corn and another cup-and- $a$-half of salsa. The leftovers can be served in a new way and I promise your family won't even reallze they're eating leftovers.

Separate the cooked Southwest chicken from the bean mixture and either shred or dice chicken. Heat skillet to medlum-high heat. Place one tablespoon of butter in skillet and allow to melt. Put tortilla in pan, top with a paim-full of cheese, then two tablespoons of chicken, two tablespoons bean mixture, covering tortilla to edges, but not piling too high. Top with a sprinkle of cheese and the second tortilla. Allow it to cook until bottom tortlla is beginning to brown, but not too much. Then flip with spatula and allow other side to cook and inside to warm completely. Top as desired with sour cream, more cheese and salsa.
