


The stage at St. Andrew's shows just a few of the missions the church supports.

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

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# Widening Of Lithia Pincrest Road Needs Your Support

Are you tired of sitting in traffic on the Lithia Pinecrest parking lot? Rest assured, the problem will not take care of itself nor is it going to get any better.

National statistics are being estimated that between now and 2025, there will be 30 million more homes built. It is also estimated that the average person will be getting in and out of their vehicle 10 times a day. Living in an area as nice as ours, you can bet we will get our fair share of homes being built here.

More homes are not all that

bad when you take the transportation issues out of the equation. New homes provide jobs and generate the funds for our government to meet their budgetary needs. Factor in transportation and proper planning is needed to correctly solve the problem.

Which brings me to Lithia Pinecrest. This is a failed road as defined by the Dept of Transportation. The road isn't wide enough to accommodate the amount of traffic that is using it daily. Plus there's the safety issue of daily wrecks. And this is a designated evacuation route in the event of a hurricane.

The good news is, the PD&E

study will be completed this year. After this step, funds are needed to go forward with the widening. There was a request to have the study done to meet Federal standards. This was done with the foresight of where to get funds for this project. To be eligible for funds, Lithia Pinecrest has to be on the list of recommended roads for improvement by the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO). The MPO has a shortterm list (5 years) and a longterm list (20-25 years). Presently Lithia isn't on either list.

The bad news is, there is a small group of people (less than 50) who live at the south end

of Lithia who are determined to completely halt this project. Some are not willing to plan for the future, some who don't travel Lithia during rush hour traffic.

How can 50 people affect the approximately 50,000 people who use Lithia? By being the squeaky wheel. Our county commissioners and the MPO have heard from this group, now they need to hear from the rest of us. Your voice needs to be heard by the county commissioners. Let them know you support the expansion of Lithia. A simple email saying, "Yes, I want the Lithia Pinecrest road transportation problems solved" will

do the trick.



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
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
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# Rajun' Bull Marching Band Enjoys Success

These include:

- Child Restraint violations =
- Red Light Violations = \$216
- Speeding Over Posted Limit = Up to \$266
- · Speeding in School Zone or Construction Zone = Up to
- · Failure to Stop for a School Bus = \$191

Folks, paying these fines because you got in a hurry or were not paying attention is senseless. Save your money for your bills and your family.

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approaching seniors posing as contractors hired to spray their homes, then "accidentally spraying the homeowner, helping them remove the spray and then running off with their jewelry."

One very important point. Keep your garage doors closed if you're not in them. This is how the thieves get in.

#### **CRIME IN PARK AREAS**

We all enjoy our parks and want them to be safe. But, there are those who use them as places to commit crimes. Some gangs like to hang out in them. County rules state that parks are to be closed at night. If you live near a park or drive by one, keep an eye out and report any suspicious activity to the Sheriff's Office.

#### **FIRE WATCH**

In cooperation with the Hillsborough County Fire/Rescue we are asking all residents to be prepared for the possibility of wild fires. The recent freezes, coupled with very low amounts of rain and a severe water shortage in affect equals extreme conditions for wild fires. Residents who live near wooded areas are especially asked to make preparations and check your areas closely. All outside cooking must be very closely monitored. No outside burning is allowed! Be extra careful using equipment that is gasoline powered and that have hot exhausts.

Do not throw your cigarette butts onto grassy areas!

These extreme conditions will exist for a very long time.

Be very careful! Fire destroys and fire kills!

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



Outdoor Impressions owner, Jason Smith, checks out the water feature at his store's new design center with his son, Andrew, age 4.

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


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#### Juliior Golf: Its Not Just A Game



#### **Pork Chops with Gravy & Onions**


1/2 c. flour 2 1/2 teaspoons dry ground mustard 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder 6 pork chops (1" thick) 16 oz. chicken broth, heated 2 tablespoons vegetable oil 1 strawberry onion, slice (both the green & white part of the onion)

Combine first 4 ingredients in a shallow dish;



dredge chops in mix and set aside. Combine remaining flour mix and heated chicken broth in a 3 ½ quart slow cooker, stirring until lumps are gone. Sauté chops in oil in skillet on medium high just until browned. Place browned chops down in gravy in slow cooker. Sauté sliced onion in pan that chops were cooked in, scraping the bottom of the pan to get the bits & pieces left by the chops. At this point, you may need to add another tablespoon of oil. Sauté until tender. Once onions are cooked to tender, add to slow cooker on top of chops and cook on high for 2-2 1/2 hours.
