As summer swelters on, staying cool isn't just a matter of comfort—it's crucial for your health. Heat advisories are issued when temperatures soar to levels that can pose serious risks, especially to vulnerable individuals. Here's what you need to know to stay safe and beat the heat.



What is a Heat Advisory?

A heat advisory is a warning issued by meteorological authorities when high humidity and hot temperatures are expected to combine to create conditions where heat-related illnesses are possible. These advisories are not to be taken lightly, as they signify a potential threat to health, particularly among the elderly, young children, and those with pre-existing medical conditions.

Signs of Heat Illness and Stroke

Recognizing the signs of heat-related illnesses is crucial for prompt intervention:

- Heat Exhaustion: Symptoms include heavy sweating, weakness, dizziness, nausea, headache, and fainting.

- Stay Indoors: If possible, stay in air-conditioned spaces during the hottest parts of the day (typically from 10 AM to 4 PM).
- Dress Appropriately: Wear lightweight, loose-fitting clothing and a hat when outdoors.
- Take It Easy: Avoid strenuous activities and exercise outdoors during peak heat hours.

By staying informed and taking proactive steps, you can enjoy the summer months safely. Remember, the goal is to beat the heat, not be beaten by it. Stay cool, stay hydrated, and stay safe!

For adults aged 18 and above, the challenge involves delving into the world of books with a goal to read a total of 4 books by the end of summer. Each completed book earns participants a digital badge, and reaching milestones also brings tangible rewards:

- 1 Book Read: Celebrate with a book to enrich your personal library.
- 2 Books Read: Mark your achievement with a commemorative sticker.
- 3 Books Read: Add another sticker to your collection.
- 4 Books Read: Conclude the challenge with a practical booklight, perfect for late-night reading sessions.

If you haven't registered, that's the first step. Then, begin logging your reading hours or books read from June 1st onwards. Whether you prefer the feel of a physical book in your hands or the convenience of an e-reader, this challenge is tailored to accommodate your reading style.



While there is never just one season for crime, keeping an eye out for us and each other keeps the community safe. Recently, a member of our community was approached while shopping, and felt unsafe in the interaction that followed. For their privacy, the Gazette is not naming them in this report.



While shopping recently, the community member was approached by someone asking to pray with them, which they refused. When the person who approached them did not stop, the community member realized that there was another person in the same aisle who had moved away from their cart with their belongings, seemingly being targeted by someone else on the other side of the aisle.

Distraction thieves operate in pairs, often targeting those who are alone and older. For distraction thieves to gain access to what they are targeting, one person of the pair - usually a woman - will distract the victim, while the other completes the theft. From their recounting of events, this felt like a potential attack.

Following what they believed to be good protocol, they contacted the corporate anti-loss line and local police.

The officer told our community member that while distraction thieves have yet to be reported in the Brandon area, it was in the best interest to keep an eye out in case more events like this happen.

Keep this in mind while shopping both by yourself and when out in stores in our community. We can all do our part to help keep one another safe and protect those who may become unknowing victims simply by being observant in our daily outings.



Hillsborough County Commissioners Present Wade Boggs Athletic Achievement Award Winner from Bloomingdale High School; Honorable Mentions from Leto and Durant

Hillsborough County, Fla. (June 5, 2024) – The Hillsborough County Board of County Commissioners recognized three outstanding student-athletes with the 18th annual Wade Boggs Athletic Achievement Award and two Honorable Mentions during today's meeting.

The Wade Boggs Athletic Achievement Award honors a high school baseball player or team in Hillsborough County who displays outstanding athletic, scholastic, and community achievements.

The 2024 Wade Boggs Athletic Achievement Award winner is Cooper Hinson of Bloomingdale High. A two-time Perfect Game High School All-American and two-time All-Western Conference First Team, Hinson led Bloomindale to the State Final Four this season. He hit a whopping .448 this season, with 39 hits, 34 runs scored, 19 runs batted in, 10 doubles, and two home runs. Academically and community wise, his achievements are equally impressive: a 5.84 GPA, four-year member of the National Honor Society, and Bloomingdale Booster Scholar-Athlete Award recipient. He has volunteered with Best Buddies and Meals on Wheels, and is a member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, among other organizations. In addition, Hinson co-founded the Bloomingdale Basketball and Whiffle Ball leagues for students. He will attend Marshall University, where he will play baseball and pursue a law degree.

Honorable Mentions went to Demetrios Passalaris of Leto High and Blaine Rowland from Durant.

Passalaris was Leto's top pitcher his junior and senior years. This season, he had a 3-2 record, with 55 strikeouts in 46 innings pitched, and a 3.5 ERA. The last two seasons combined, he recorded over 70 strikeouts. The team's captain and leader, Passalaris had a cumulative grade point average of 7.5 and earned an associate in arts degree his senior year. He will attend Florida State University.

Rowland lettered in baseball all four years at Durant, and was All-County in both pitching and outfield last year. He set the regular season hit record for the school, was 6-0 in 43 innings pitched, with 73 strikeouts and a 1.46 ERA, while hitting .541. He drove in 26 runs and had two homeruns. Rowland, a National Honor Society member and part of Durant's Honor Court, will attend the University of Florida, where he will play baseball.

About the Wade Boggs Athletic Achievement Award

The Board of County Commissioners established the award in 2005 in honor of first-ballot National Baseball Hall of Fame member Wade Boggs. A resident of the Tampa Bay area since he was a child, Boggs is a 12-time All Star who ended his 18-year Major League Baseball career as a member of the Tampa Bay Devil Rays, who retired his number 12 in 2000. The Boston Red Sox also honored Boggs when they retired his number 26 in 2016. His career statistics include 3,010 hits, 1,513 runs, 578 doubles, 61 triples, 118 home runs, 1,014 runs batted in, and a batting average of .328. It's the time of year for fun in the sun – whether it be at the water park, the pool, or the beach, there's no shortage of activities that can keep you cool in the heat.

So how do you keep your loved ones safe on an outing to the beach? Just like with drowning incidences at a pool, monitoring is key. Rip currents move quicker than a swimmer can, and most people who try to out swim it end up drowning from fatigue. For that reason, it's important to follow posted signs and listen to life guards.



If you're caught in a rip current, the first instinct is to swim towards shore – but that's counterintuitive to what will end up keeping you safe. According to NOAA, if you're caught in a rip current, wait it out until you're out of the current – then, swim parallel to the shore and back to land at an angle.

If you can't swim, tread water and call for help. Swim only where posted lifeguards are available in case of emergency and, as always, relax and keep calm in dangerous situations. If you're on the shore and see someone caught in a rip current, get help as quickly as you can.
